## OVERVIEW

March's 2026, visitor arrivals to Anguilla's shores numbered 33,327 arrivals; an increase of 47.3% over its corresponding March 2025 figure of 22,625. This period under review is recorded as having the highest number of arrivals to Anguilla, for any March period, over the past 34 years. The second highest total number of visitor arrivals was recorded in 2025 with 22,625 and the third highest of 22,189 arrivals in 2024.

The overall increase in visitor arrivals was driven by growth in both categories; stayover visitors and day-trippers, each recording increases when compared to their respective totals in 2025. The majority (99.0%) of the visitors during this period came with the intention of vacationing, while 0.1% came for business.

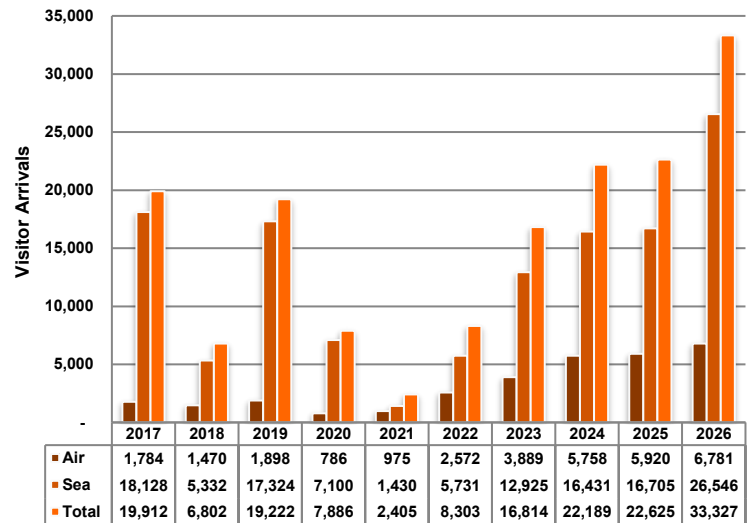


Figure 1: Visitor Arrivals, March 2017 – 2026

## PASSENGER MOVEMENT

Passenger arrivals, which include both visitors and residents for March 2026, increased by 37.3% over its corresponding March 2025 figure of 29,951 arrivals to 41,122.

Anguilla's inward passenger movement by sea totalled 33,096 (80.5%) of total passenger arrivals. The Blowing Point terminal welcomed 22,196 (67.1%) of the passenger arrivals who came by sea and the remaining 10,900 (32.9%) arrived at the Sandy Ground terminal. Passenger arrivals by air via Clayton J. Lloyd International Airport accounted for 8,026 (19.5%) of total passenger arrivals.

Departing passenger numbers recorded an increase of 32.1% over March 2025 corresponding figure of 30,572 to 40,395 in March 2026.

Of the three ports of exit, the two seaports cumulatively accounted for 32,508 (80.5%) of all departures, with the Blowing Point terminal facilitating the movement of 21,606 (66.5%) and Sandy Ground 10,902 (33.5%) passengers by sea.

By air, 7,887 (19.5%) of total passengers departing Anguilla exited through the Clayton J. Lloyd International Airport.

## TOURISTS (Stay-Over Visitors)

Tourists (stay-over visitors) to Anguilla for March 2026 totalled 16,693, an increase of 30.7% over the corresponding 2025 figure of 12,772. A review of the data as far back as 1993 shows that the number of tourist arrivals for March 2026 ranked the highest for any March period. The second highest recorded number of tourists was registered in 2024 with 13,397 and the third highest in 2025 with 12,772 arrivals.

The total number of tourist arrivals for the March 2026 represented a 50.1% share of Anguilla's total visitor arrivals.

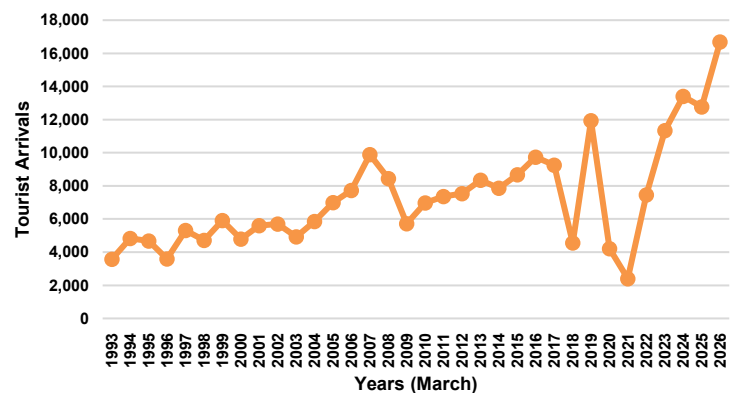


Figure 2: Tourist Arrivals, March 1993 – 2026

**Tourists (Stay-Over Visitors)** *continued*

The intended average length of stay for tourists for March 2026 was 5.9 days, a decrease from 6.4 days in March 2025. The majority of tourist arrivals; 56.0% intended to stay for 4 to 7 days, followed by 28.4% intended to stay for 1 to 3 days, 11.3% of whom intended to stay for 8 – 15 days, 3.3% intended to stay for 23 or more days and 1.1% indicated 16 to 22 days.

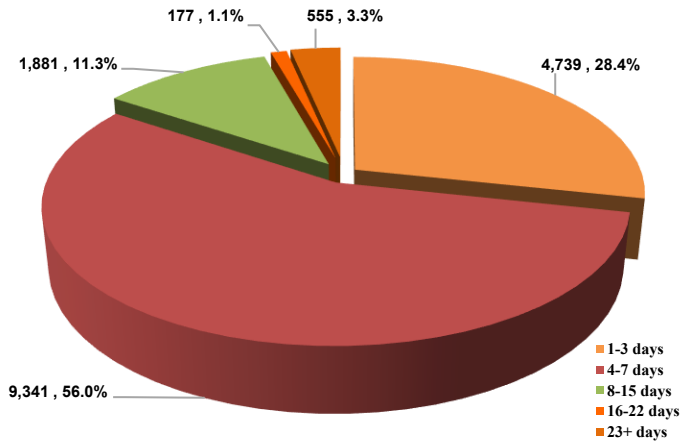


Figure 3: Tourist Arrivals by Intended Length of Stay, March 2026

A review of the ten (10) source markets from which the 16,693 tourists to Anguilla originated showed seven (7) recorded increases. The majority of the tourist arrivals, 75.9% (12,677), were from the ‘USA’ source market, an increase of 29.7% over its corresponding 2025 figure. The ‘Other European’ and ‘Canadian’ source markets followed with shares of 7.5% (1,247) and 5.8% (962) of the tourist market respectively. The declines were experienced by the ‘Other’, ‘French West Indies’ and ‘Dutch West Indies’ markets by 54.9%, 33.1% and 9.4% respectively.

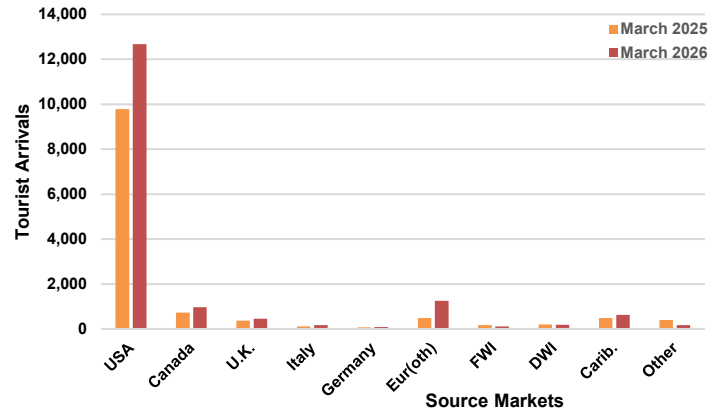


Figure 4: Tourist Arrivals by Country of Residence, March 2025 & 2026

**EXCURSIONISTS (Day Trippers)**

Excursionist arrivals for this period under review, March 2026 totaled 16,634, an increase of 68.8% over the corresponding March 2025 figure of 9,853 arrivals. This figure under review was recorded as the highest ranked March total number of excursionist arrivals for any March period within the past 34 years, for which there is data. The second and third highest March ranked figures were recorded in the years 2015 and 2017 with 12,306 and 10,668 arrivals respectively. This type of visitor accounted for 49.9% of total visitors to the island during this period.

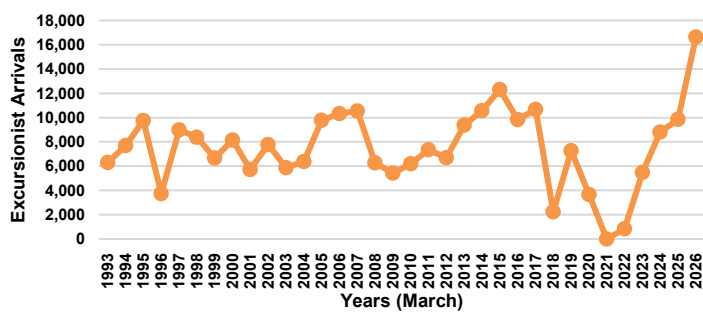


Figure 5: Excursionist Arrivals, March 1993 - 2026

A review of data for this type of visitor showed that seven (7) source markets registered an increase, contributing to the overall increase in total arrivals for this type of visitor. The largest percentage share, 65.2% (10,839) of excursionist arrivals, during this period under review, originated out of the ‘USA’. The ‘Canadian’ and ‘Other Europe’ markets followed with respective shares of 10.9% (1,821) and 9.2% (1,532). The declines were recorded by French West Indies, ‘Dutch West Indies’ and ‘Caribbean’ markets.

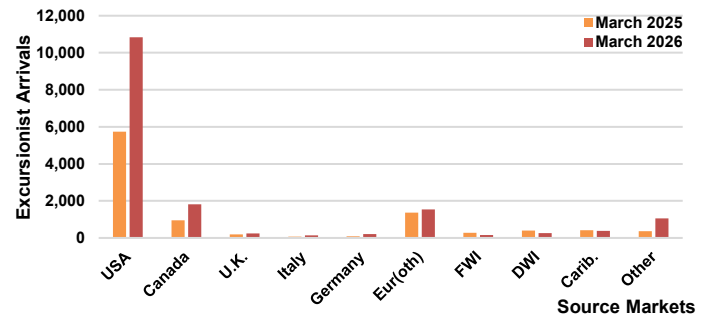


Figure 6: Excursionist Arrivals by Country of Residence, March 2025 & 2026
